Check out the following ideas to have fun with your preschooler. Choose any activity that fits your schedule and cross it off the list when you give it a try.

Take photos of your child. Use a tablet or phone and let your child take photos too!	Print a few of the photos and fold the pages into a book. Your child can "read" the pictures of what you did yesterday.	Look up information online or in a dictionary. Show your child that print can be meaningful and helpful.	Look at pictures in a magazine or book. Ask your child to tell you about the picture.	Watch a TV show together. Ask your child to talk about the show during commercials.	6 Have your child join you in the kitchen. Talk about what you doing and name the objects and foods.	Go to the library. Let your child pick a book. You can read the book to your child and the child can "read" the book back to you.

Call relatives or friends to get enough "voters." Who wins?	Find a pattern in your home or on the way home. Ask your child to tell you about the pattern after you have explained it.
